As regional finalists, they were then entered into the national competition at Harrogate Conference Centre on Saturday 26th February.

Through meticulous programming, rehearsals with the presentation and use of their creative skills for the innovative part of the competition, the team excelled in all areas and were ranked third in the First Lego League Robot programming aspect of the competition.

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It never ceases to amaze me how bright, intelligent and articulate our young men are, which in turn makes my committed team of staff want to commit more of their time and efforts with the young men.

On Friday 18th March, we are hosting our class of 2020/21 for a presentation evening and BBQ event. As a school, the feedback I was getting is the young men deserved an auspicious event in light of all the trials and tribulations they faced during the COVID 19 pandemic. The pandemic continued to affect decisions and outcomes for them even after they had finished their schooling here at TIBHS. An annual presentation evening was planned for Friday 28th January 2022 however, due to the rise of infections during the Winter months, the event was cancelled. The BBQ event which will take place pre-Ramadan, on the school grounds with external caterers offering a high-end delectable meal. It will be an occasion where our current Year 12s can have a reunion with peers and also an opportunity to have a catch up with their teachers and give an update as to their current status and position.

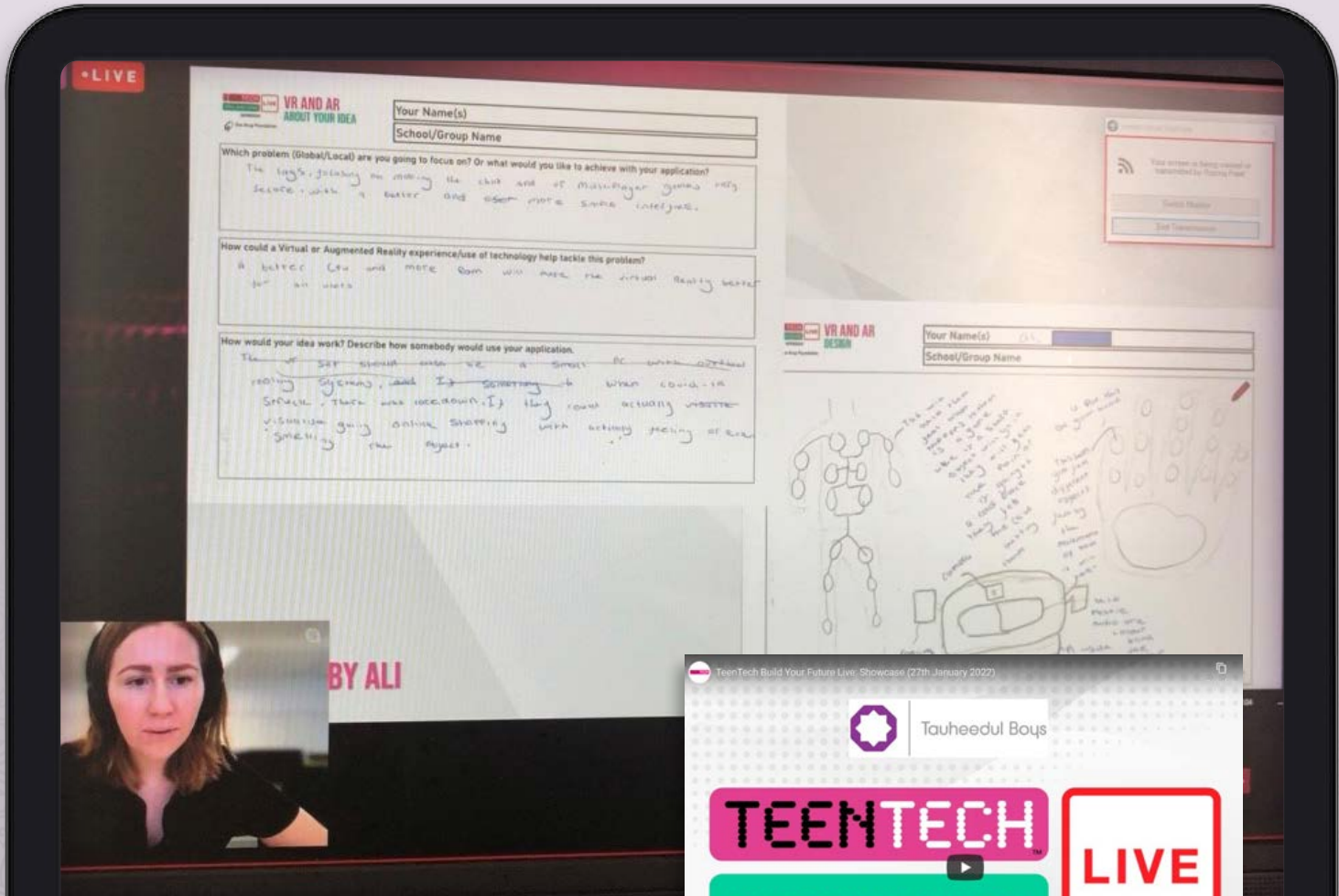

Teen Tech

On 27th January 2022, our computing class, 8 Co1 were given the opportunity to take part in an exciting programme of Innovation session and Teen Tech City of Tomorrow events for students aged 8- 19.

Teen Tech Live, Lancashire brought the exciting world of science and technology to our classroom, where we got a chance to be creative and think outside the box.

We were set a challenge to focus on a local or global problem and think about how the virtual or augmented reality experience how the use of technology can help tackle this problem. We had to think long and hard to figure out how we can use Virtual Reality and Augmented Reality to improve our existing world.

Much to our own surprise, our designs exceeded far beyond the expectations of our hosts, and we reportedly impressed them, shining positivity on our wonderful school. The focus of the brief was to improve an already existing idea or bring a new one to life to help the wider community.

I designed a set of spectacles specifically targeted at those with a visual impairment or to those individuals with no visibility at all.

The glasses would have a total of four cameras to allow for a more natural view. Each camera had a total of 286 megapixels, which is the resolution of the naked eye. They had neurological electrical receptors which allowed for the almost instantaneous display of pictures. This would significantly improve visibility of the visually impaired and allow them to always stay safe and access a world which healthy eyed people experience.

Once we had designed out AR (augmented reality) devices, we were given the opportunity to ask industry experts live questions and received instantaneous feedback. It was really engaging and highly interactive.

All in all, I am hugely grateful for the opportunity supplied by the Computer Science department, and we collectively look forward to taking part in similar wonderful experiences again.

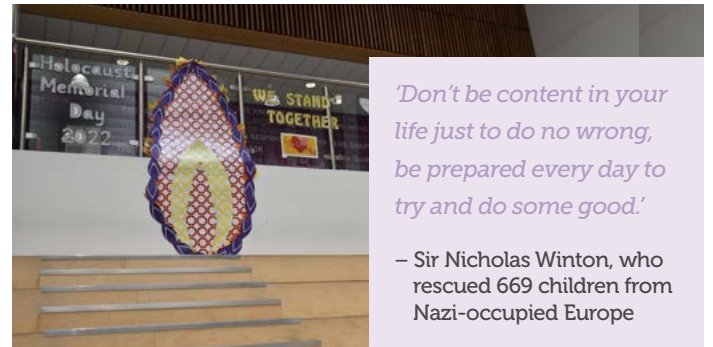
Holocaust Memorial Day 2022

The holocaust is one of the most notorious acts of genocide recorded in modern history, with the many atrocities committed by Nazi Germany before and during World War two destroyed millions of lives and permanently altered the face of not just Europe, but the world.

The holocaust took place primarily in Germany and in Poland, but also other countries that Germany had occupied during World War two. Concentration camps and violence against Jews spread in and throughout Central and Eastern Europe as the Nazi government took over more of the country, until the end of the war in 1945.

This year marks 77 years since the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau. To commemorate such a historical and tragic event TIBHS pupils we took part in the Holocaust Memorial Day memorial service in Blackburn Town Hall and the Cathedral virtually and saw the truly experienced Rabbi Arnold Saunders who told his story of how he and his family had escaped the horrors and torture of the Holocaust. The event left pupils with a deeper understanding and an overwhelming sense of gratitude for the safety and security in which we are shrouded with today.

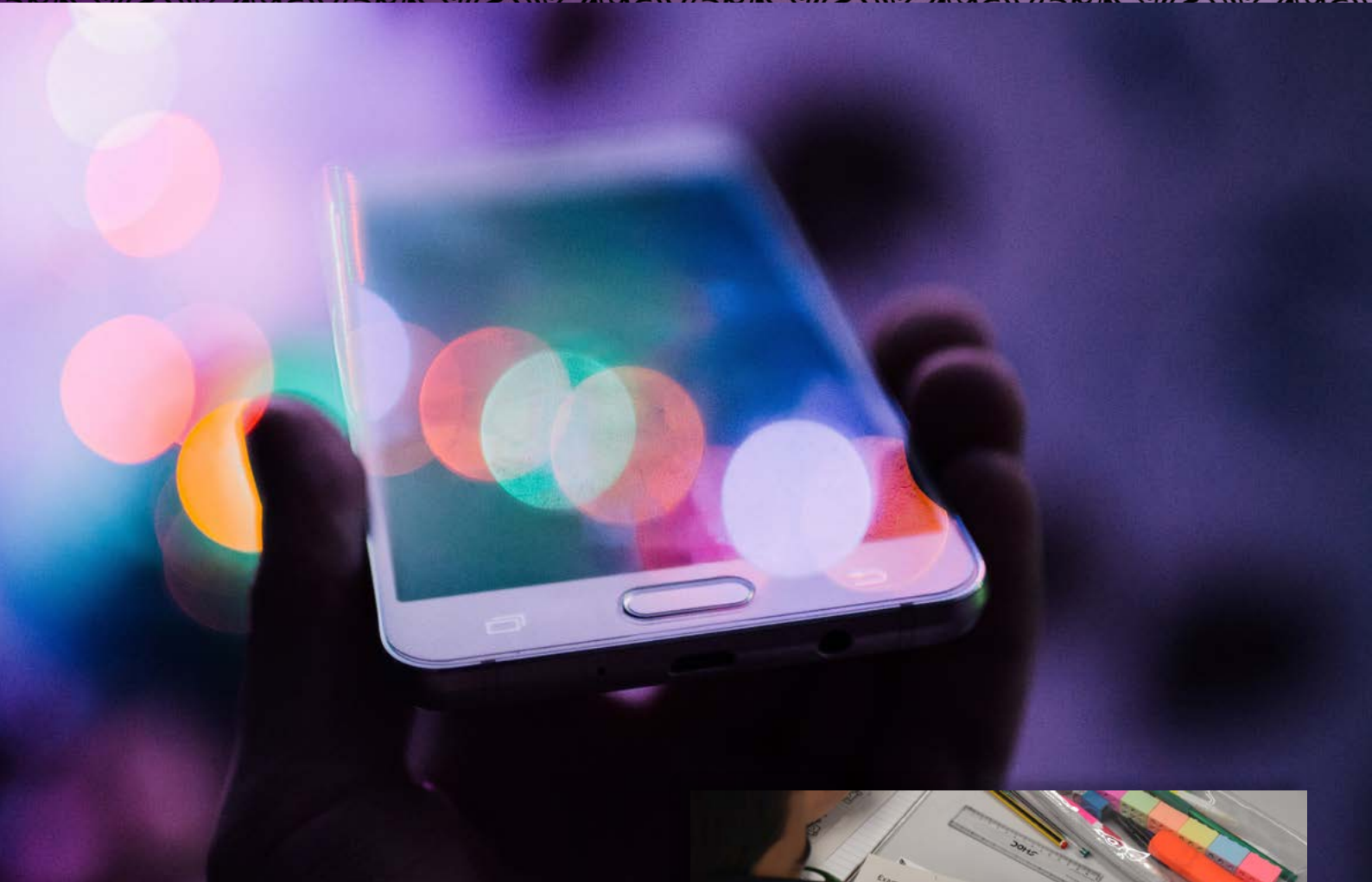

On the 8th February 2022, TIBHS celebrated Safer Internet Day. The theme this year was 'All fun and games?' with a focus on exploring respect and relationships online.

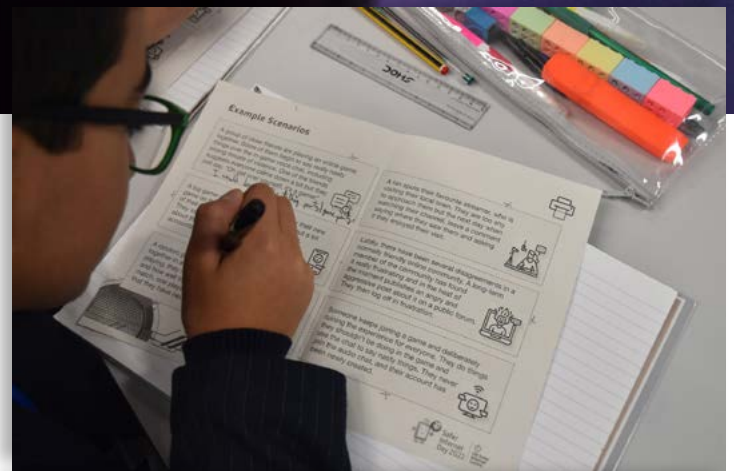

TB6 Application Guidance Day

As Tauheedul Islam Boys' High School approaches its 10-year anniversary, the school prepares for a further transformation through the introduction of TB6 – TIBHS' very own sixth form.

From September 2022, TB6 will offer core and facilitating STEM-related subjects that will enable sixth form students to progress to leading universities and employers.

TB6 will offer A levels in Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics and Economics. There will also be a vocational qualification in BTEC Applied Science, and additional AS levels in Modern Foreign Languages for native speakers.

The highlight of our sixth form's offer will be the TB6 Excellence Programme, which will focus on the development of personal skills and character development. The coaching and mentoring of the TB6 Excellence Programme will have an inherent, lifelong value and universities as well as leading companies often favour candidates who can demonstrate specific soft skills and attributes.

On Friday 4th February, TB6 held its first ever Application Guidance Day. A buffet lunch was provided before pupils were given a personal interview to discuss the A Level or BTEC subjects they are most likely to study. Student places for TB6 have been offered for a September 2022 place. SW100 Visit – Inspiring those that seek to Inspire

Based on the conviction that closing the disadvantage gap is possible, SW100 is a new school leadership programme for Devon and Cornwall.

Developed by Education South-West, Ted Wragg Trust, West Country Schools Trust and the Reach Foundation, SW100 has been designed to provide the knowledge needed to lead great schools and access learning from highly effective schools regionally, nationally and internationally.

It is the SW Institute for Teaching (SWIFT); a one-year development programme and a lifelong network preparing individuals to become outstanding SW headteachers. Over the next five years, they will train and nurture 100 of the region's next Head Teachers.

On Wednesday 9th February, as a school, we were handpicked and given the honour of hosting a group of headteachers from the South-West of England, under the SW100 initiative.

In Devon and Cornwall, the disadvantage gap is worse than the national average at all stages. In both counties, disadvantaged children start primary school more than five months behind their peers and end up in secondary school nearly 21 months behind.

But it does not have to be this way.

There are schools and counties in the country, such as TIBHS, where the disadvantage gap has been eliminated. Through the collaboration of the SW100 project, the aim is to achieve the same in the South-West.

To this effect, an ambitious and passionate group of leaders came together in September 2021 to work with the Reach Foundation to learn more about the best practice and cutting-edge research behind what makes schools successful in closing the disadvantage gap

The delegate headteachers have visited a range of highly successful schools in London and the North of England to see how research-

informed strategies have been implemented with great success. Whilst context is important, there is no question that these visits will have provided inspirational insights that the headteachers can take back to the South-West, whilst also building a positive and cohesive network of professionals that can learn and support one another.

On the day of the visit, there were presentations made by members of the SLT, Middle Leaders and Trust. Presentations included STAR teaching framework and STAR teachers playbook, the Behave like a STAR playbook, careers and enterprise, character development and service to the community.

The delegates also had an opportunity to have a tour of the school to witness first-hand the quality of provision, along with the opportunity to gain an experience of the culture, ethos and atmosphere. Mufti Hamid, our CEO, also attended to share his overview on the Star Trust vision and values regarding disadvantaged pupils.

The visit was a complete success. The delegate headteachers were truly inspired with what they had seen and heard and how the school has a zero tolerance to any form of under achievement irrespective of any group profile description.

Lisa Crausby, a director who was also in attendance on the day got the following feedback from the Headteacher delegate team:

"Our guests were unanimously in awe of what you are doing for all pupils and quoted TIBHS as their best school visit to date. This is high praise particularly as they have visited around 10 outstanding schools so far including schools from Reach, Ark, United Learning, Dixons and Outwood Grange."

TIBHS is committed to serving to the best of its ability. The strong emphasis that social mobility through education is the vehicle to change lifestyles and landscapes, resonates strongly throughout the school and amongst our various stakeholder community members.

TIBHS is committed to supporting other schools in the development of strategy and policy. This aligns well with the work the school is doing in partnership with the STAR Trust and the NW Lancashire Teaching Hub. In addition, we continue to support schools such as The Valley High school in raising attainment in English and maths by working directly with their pupils and supporting Eden Boys' School in Bradford in readiness for their first OFSTED inspection.

Our boys, who are supported by the SEND department, had a fantastic opportunity to take a trip into our local town centre – to learn how to manage money and develop independence.

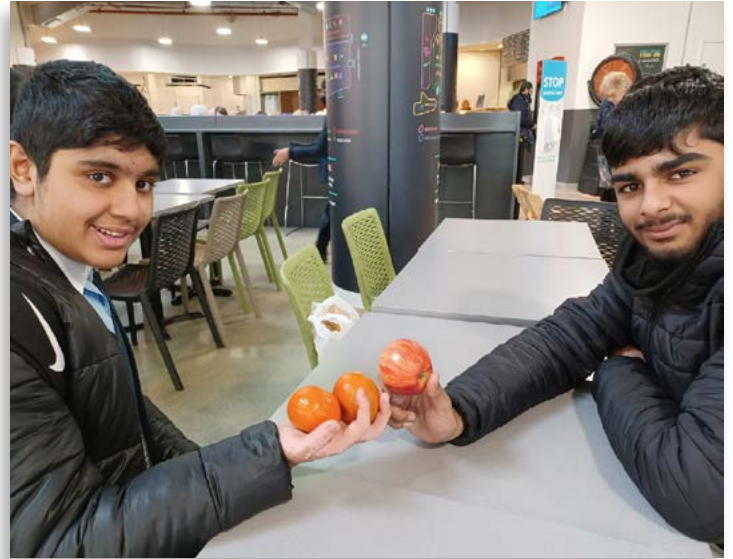
