# TIBHS Pupils Celebrate GCSE Success

Pupils at Tauheedul Islam Boys' High School (TIBHS) celebrated their GCSE results following a return of exams after three years.

On 25th August 2022, pupils at TIBHS collected another exceptional set of GCSE results, which were earned against a backdrop of challenges including lockdowns, periods of self-isolation and ill health.

Moosa Hajat thanked the staff and teachers at TIBHS after he achieved the top grade 9 in ten GCSE subjects. Moosa has chosen to further his education by studying for A levels at St. Wilfrid's Sixth Form.

Aspiring engineer Taahaa Mussagibai achieved the top grade 9 in nine subjects. Taahaa praised the support he received at the school, which he said had encouraged him to have high aspirations and try his hardest.

Muhammed Zain Patel was also beaming with pride at his results. Muhammed achieved grade 9 in five subjects and grade 8 in four subjects. Muhammed Zain thanked his school family and paid tribute to the supportive environment that had helped him to achieve his very best.

At the school, 84% of pupils achieved GCSEs with grades 9-5 in English and Maths, which is expected to place the school's performance in the top 1% nationally.

## STAR's World Class Book Culture

TIBHS launched its Star World-Class Book Culture Programme in September 2002. It was welcomed with an overwhelming response by pupils and teachers alike.

As the saying goes Christmas had certainly arrived early at TIBHS as books of various genres were delivered to all classes enabling pupils to access culturally rich literature from across the globe. Including some of the prestigious writers such as Charles Dickens, H.G. Wells, Ray Bradbury, George Orwell to more contemporary writers such as Malorie Blackman, Malala Yousafzai, Jamila Gavin, R.J Palacio to name a few.

In the short period of time since its launch pupils are already reaping the benefits which is clearly evident as the library has had an influx of pupils with books flying off the shelves.

The programme facilitates and allows pupils the opportunity to improve their reading and literacy skills. Research shows how vital it is for pupils to read and expand their vocabulary enabling them to flourish in their studies and exams contributing to an improvement in their life chances.

#### Read Aloud

Read Aloud is a key component of the Star World-Class Book Culture Programme and each year group received six specially selected books. Three days a week, pupils benefit from hearing their form teachers and peers read the book aloud followed by comprehensive discussions regarding the narrative that took place. Each pupil has his own individual copy of the book. Pupils are taken on a journey of adventure, creativity, imagination and exploration, opening their eyes to different life experiences.

#### Star Readers Challenge

All pupils can accept the challenge if they wish to do so, and this message does not self-destruct therefore it's not too late to join if you already haven't done so. Visit the library and get your hands on a Star Reader book, which are in high demand - so speed is of the essence. In addition to children becoming confident independent readers, all pupils who complete the challenge will qualify for the coveted Star Reader Award in July 2023 which includes a prize. It's an opportunity you do not want to miss!

#### ReadingWise programme at a Glance!

At TIBHS we recognise that not everyone starts off as a confident and fluent reader. To ensure that we bridge any gaps for pupils who require extra support, Star Academies have partnered with ReadingWise; which is an intense literacy intervention programme delivered online. It helps to increase pupils' reading ages by up to 10 months over the course of a single term. The ReadingWise programme consists of a range of modules including engaging and interactive Comprehension and Decoding modules, which are used respectively as intervention for our pupils who have been identified as reading below their chronological reading age to help bridge the gap. It is bespoke to each pupil's individual needs to ensure they reach their full potential. In addition, an exclusive Vocab module is available to all pupils and set as homework for all pupils in years 7-9 - who are required to complete 30 minutes of work online on a weekly basis.

# Blackburn Teen Wins Bright Future Prize

A 15-year-old amazing young man from Blackburn has won a prestigious international prize thanks to his work recycling school uniforms and supporting the local community.

Muhammad Karbhari, was awarded £10,000 funding by the Ardonagh Community Trust (ACT), Bright Future Prize 2022, which attracted entries from all over the world.

Now in its second year, The Bright Future Prize aims to empower young people aged 13-19 to become the next generation of community leaders by funding their bright ideas that will make a difference to their chosen cause.

This year, £40,000 was awarded to winners over four categories, each connected to a different way young people can help spark a positive change in the world around them.

Muhammad's bright idea, which won the Your Vision category, focused on helping the pupil-led social enterprise, Uniformity, at Tauheedul Islam Boys' High School in Blackburn, part of Star Academies, reach new heights. The enterprise helps parents and carers access affordable school uniforms whilst as the same time helping the planet and local community.

Uniformity upcycles school uniforms, enabling parents to donate and purchase used clothing via an innovative e-commerce platform. All profits go straight into funding the school's food bank, so not only does it provide a way to reuse uniform and tackle the environmental impact of clothing it also helps local people access vital supplies.

Now, with the enterprise growing, the team have set their sights on expanding to more schools in the area, and are planning to purchase their own dry-cleaning machine to reduce costs and upgrade their online platform to make it simpler to donate and purchase clothing.

Muhammad said: "It's an amazing feeling. This funding will help so

many people in the long run, not just those needing affordable clothing.

"It will help us to expand and means our foodbanks can help even more people in the area.

"It's great to know I'm supported by not only everyone at Tauheedul Islam Boys' High School but also at ACT. Thank you for choosing us, we are very excited for the future."

ACT Trustee and former Irish and British Lions Rugby Captain, Rory Best said: "It's been a huge honour to select the winners of this year's Bright Future Prize.

"All of the finalists had incredible ideas –and I was impressed by their drive to use their own experiences and passion to give back to others and make a difference.

"I'm sure all our finalists will inspire many more young people to get involved in the communities that matter to them. Myself, and the rest of ACT's Trustees can't wait to see how our winners use the funding to make their ideas happen!"

The Bright Future Prize was inspired by Freddie Williams, the son of Ardonagh employee David and his wife Sarah who was diagnosed with a rare form of bone cancer at the age of seven.

When Freddie died, the contents of his money box were donated to ACT to help 'the next poorly child'. This simple gesture led to the idea of the Bright Future Prize, to support young people to make a positive impact – and as part of Freddie's continued legacy, David and Sarah help the ACT Trustees to select its Bright Future Prize winners.


# Imperial College Head Of Medical Admission

### Harvard Admissions

Students from Tauheedul Islam Boys' High School (TIBHS) have received a historic visit from one of the world's most prestigious universities.

A representative from Harvard University visited TIBHS' newly opened Sixth Form, TB6, to give the school's sixth form students an insight into an Ivy League education.

It is thought to be the first time the world-renowned institution has visited Blackburn in an official capacity and demonstrates the academic alignment between Harvard and TB6. Harvard's visit provides TB6's erudite students and their families with an insight into an Ivy League education and the bespoke support they will receive from the school to secure places on the most competitive university courses.

Harvard University is part of an elite group of eight American universities, known as Ivy League colleges, which are widely considered to be amongst the most prestigious academic institutions in the world. Harvard is located in Cambridge, Massachusetts and its alumni include eight US presidents, 10 Academy Award winners, 48 Pulitzer Prize winners and 110 Olympic medallists.

The visit to TIBHS marks the beginning of a strategic relationship between Harvard University and Star Academies, the multi-academy trust which runs TIBHS and 30 other schools around the country.

During the visit, students from TIBHS, along with those from The Valley Leadership Academy in Bacup, also part of Star Academies, learnt about the exciting possibilities of studying at an Ivy League university and how the experience and application process for American universities differs from the UK. The scholarship opportunities available to UK students were also explained, as well as how the 'cultural capital' gained from studying overseas increases employability chances and opens doors to the world's leading businesses and organisations.

Not only will the relationship allow students across all Star secondary schools to realise the opportunities of studying abroad, it will give them access to tailored tutoring and guidance in addition to their studies, to give them the best chance of being successful in the competitive application process for Ivy League and other elite global universities.

A selection of students from TIBHS will also be crossing the Atlantic in November to visit Harvard University.

The partnership is part of Star's new Elite University Preparation Programme, which seeks to raise pupils' aspirations and give them the best support possible to access not only Oxbridge and Russell Group universities, but Ivy League and other prestigious international institutions. The programme will ensure that talented students who study in Star sixth forms, such as TB6, are provided with a comprehensive package of support to enable them to achieve their ambitions.

"It was an honour to welcome such an elite university to our new TB6 sixth form and we're very proud to be part of what is a historic visit for this area.

#### Speaking about what he learned from the presentation, student Muhammed Karbhari said:

"Before the talk I hadn't even thought of the possibility of studying in the US, but hearing about all the advantages makes it seem like a really exciting opportunity.

"Whatever I decide to do in the future I know we'll have the support from all of the teachers and other students here to realise my ambitions."

Along with opportunities for pupils, Star has plans for staff across its family of schools to receive specialist teacher training from the Harvard Graduate School of Education, with the first group of staff expected to visit the US later this year.




# Inaugural Star Oxbridge Conference And Supervisions — Striving For Ambition.

# **BAE Systems**Roadshow







In addition to this, another 1.25 million pupils receive free meals under the universal free school meal provision for infant schools (Gov.uk, 2022). These figures are hard to comprehend and easy to turn in to a statistic until you realise that each figure represents a hungry child.

According to charity, The Joseph Rowntree Foundation, we have an estimated 4.3 million children in the U.K. living in what is called "relative poverty". However only 2.3 million children currently get free school meals.

In these uncertain times, we welcome the help from local heroes like Ishfaq Farooq (Managing Director) from My Lahore and the Amir Khan Foundation in supplying meals to our school for children on free school meals. The weekly biryani delivery from My Lahore is greatly anticipated for our most vulnerable children and families. Delivering these weekly hot meals together, we have been able to go some way in helping to alleviate food poverty within the community. With the help of Tabarak Hussain (Year 11 Deputy Head Boy) and Hassan Ali Nazir (Year 11), these meal packs are packed on site and distributed to pupils who are eligible. These two gentlemen truly represent our star values by going out of their way to help the vulnerable - a true inspiration.

We welcome working alongside My Lahore and the Amir Khan Foundation in the coming weeks and months to bring some hope and help to struggling families within our school community.

We are valuable volunteers for Brookhouse Development Group (BHDG), a non-profit organisation established in 2015 that has been striving to serve Blackburn's community in various ways.

One such service for which we volunteer takes place at Pleasington Cemetery, where the BHDG volunteers support families locate, restore, and maintain the graves of their beloved, deceased family members as well as keeping the surrounding area tidy for our community. To us, this acts as a form of Sadaqah- e- Jariyah (continuous, flowing and ongoing charity), as we believe that we will be rewarded for every moment we contribute to this noble service with the hope it benefits us long after we depart from this world (Ameen).

We do this work as an act of Khidmah (Service), meeting a pressing need for the community and undertaking maintenance work that many people are not able to do themselves. The group consist of several teams: one team restores and maintains graves; another maintains the landscaping needs of the cemetery, and a third team is responsible for general maintenance. We also have a team that has been trained to support the upkeeping of the trees, ensuring the trees do not encroach on to the neighbouring grave or damage the graves; where trees are removed, BHDG plant a tree elsewhere in the world. This is just one team of many that have supported BHDG for the past 7 years.

We have volunteered with BHDG for the better part of 2 years and in this time, we have been made to feel welcome, respected, and honoured. Volunteering with the group has all the hallmarks of helping with our mental health: the physical work is good for the body, the natural surroundings are tranquil and everyone at BHDG are extremely friendly and helpful, which creates a strong bond between us. Nabeel, a Year 8 student, also joins me on Sundays at the cemetery. This is his response after asking him how his experiences with volunteering his Sundays with BHDG made him feel:

"I have extremely enjoyed coming every week, especially when you see the smiles on the faces of the family members of whose graves

we have helped to maintain. Another blessing of volunteering with BHDG is that we hear the heartfelt supplications from the family of the deceased, which makes your inner self feel warm and makes your conscious feel vitalised.

The service hours are helping us develop our leadership skills, work ethic, communication skills, our understanding of the needs of the community and our responsibility to meet such needs where possible. So, what are you waiting for? Volunteer today. We strongly believe the group can benefit from more volunteers and by contributing to the valuable work we do, there is no doubt that volunteering would benefit you too, equipping you with vital, transferrable life skills.
