#### First Lego League: Celebrating Success from Regional to Nationals!

The First Lego League is a competition which involves programming and encourages innovation especially for those with a vested interest in STEM based activities and subjects.

The First Lego League competition gives pupils a chance to embrace the STEM qualities within them, as well as giving them a hands-on experience of programming, innovative thinking, and construction. There are 3 stages to the competition to be crowned the Lego champion: Regionals, Nationals, and Internationals.

In February, TIBHS won the Regional Competition, based in Manchester earning the opportunity to partake in the Nationals taking place in Harrogate. Unfortunately, the Nationals took place on Eid Day so it required a tough decision; however, as so much time energy, passion and enthusiasm had been invested we did not want to miss this opportunity to build on our success and represent TIBHS at this prestigious level. Therefore, we prayed Eid Namaz and headed to Harrogate.

The pre-requisites for competing was to have an innovative project based on this years theme on the 'energy crisis'. The programming element involved building a robot out of Lego and programming the robot to undertake challenges set by the organiser's. Each challenge is built out of Lego and the robot must do unique challenges with an attachment also made from Lego. There are no restrictions to the type of attachment you can make, encouraging innovation and out of the box designs.

The programming element consisted of 14 challenges to be completed within 2 minute 30 seconds. The competition was fierce and initially our robot faced a few challenges due to inconsistencies, however with persistent practice, hard work and determination our efforts paid off and we overcame these as time went on.

I am writing to you on National Thank a Teacher Day to express my sincere gratitude for your hard work and dedication. I hope that yours is a school in which thanks are given daily, but this is an annual opportunity for the message to be reiterated, so thank you from the depths of my heart.

I recently had the pleasure of being interviewed by TES about my views on education. I was asked about the teachers I remembered best from my own school days, those who had the most influence on me. It was easy to pick them out. In primary school, I was taught by the remarkable Mr Silson who gave me opportunities to speak in assemblies and play a part in drama productions.

He encouraged me to apply to be captain of Kipling House and made sure that being one of a small number of Asian pupils in the school wasn't a barrier to success. He had a well-deserved reputation for strictness, but was also reliably fair, a characteristic that is top of the list when pupils from every generation describe their favourite teachers.

My most influential secondary school teacher was Mr Chorlton who taught maths - and awarded me my first achievement certificate when I was in year 8! I was by no means the best mathematician in class but he knew how much I needed recognition for my efforts. I couldn't wait to show that certificate to my parents. Praise is a great motivator.

Like many Muslim children, I spent countless hours memorising the Qur'an, supported by Imam Haroon whose patient coaching enabled me to master each syllable precisely. He was a wonderful teacher who knew that there was no substitute for hard work but made a seemingly impossible task manageable.

These three individuals epitomised the eternal qualities that great teachers continuously demonstrate – fairness, consistency, kindness, tough love, tenacity and humanity - qualities which are evident across Star schools and which make Thank a Teacher Day so important. You do so much more than deliver a curriculum. You inculcate values, nurture ambition, instil self-belief and shape lives. I am very proud of you, as are our pupils, who have recorded their own messages of appreciation.

2023 is a landmark year, the tenth anniversary of the opening of Star's first free school. The last decade has been a remarkable journey in which we have profoundly impacted the lives of thousands of young people in the disadvantaged localities we serve.

Thank you for everything you continue to do for our young people and to support your colleagues and community.










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## Adventure to the Darwen Tower & its Breath-taking Views


It was a bright and sunny day when our adventure began. A group of eager pupils, ready to explore the world beyond the confines of our classroom.

- White Jubbah Day Pupils came dressed in white Jubbahs to resemble the 2 pieces of Ihram cloth to show that we are all equal in front of the Almighty.
- Spirituality morning Pupils read Surah Kahf and Ishraq salah.

- Hajj Quiz pupils participated in a Hajj quiz in their classes where they understood and memorised questions and answers about hajj. Thereafter, their teacher held in class competitions to see who has the most knowledge about Hajj.
- Hajj and Maths pupils answered a set of maths questions based on Hajj. Pupils looked at cost of hajj, the distance travelled, and the time taken during hajj from a maths perspective.
- Saee and Tawaf races pupils went head-to-head competing in completing seven rounds of a circuit in teams to see how long it takes them. This was a riveting experience!
- Pelting the pillars-pupils mimicked the pelting of the Jamaraat in this session. Competing in teams, they threw tennis balls at cricket wickets to see if they can hit the target.
- The Prophet's Pilgrimage- pupils learnt how the Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) performed Hajj. They read through a detailed account of his hajj travelling from Madinah to Makkah with 124, 000 companions.
- Hajj Assembly with our FCE Governor Our FCE governor, Moulana Talha, delivered an in depth and emotional hajj assembly explaining the goals and purpose of Hajj.
- Hajj Video-pupils watched a short video of pilgrims performing the Hajj in the scorching heat.
- Reflections- to capture the knowledge they had learnt; pupils completed a crib sheet about hajj and Eid Ul Adha.
- Kabah Model TIBHS went one step further this year and had a Kabah model created by local businesses to help bring the Hajj experience to life. A sincere thank you to these local businesses who donated the materials as well as making it for free - all in the spirit of Hajj. A special thank you to Rightway Cash and Carry.


#### Year 12 Work **Experience**

It involves propelling a flat-bottomed boat, known as a punt, along a river or shallow waterway using a long pole called a punt pole. To punt, the punter (the person operating the punt) stands at the rear of the boat, known as the stern, with one end of the punt pole resting on the riverbed. The punter uses the pole as a lever, pushing it against the riverbed to propel the punt forward. By applying force and exerting pressure on the pole, the punter can move the boat in the desired direction. We couldn't help but reflect on this experience and how closely it mirrors our journey in life as we fight many forces in our pursuit to achieve our ambitions.

The experience of visiting Oxford University and its libraries, including Brasenose College library, is a journey into the realm of knowledge and learning. The rich history, architectural splendour, and intellectual vibrancy make this experience truly unforgettable. "I now know what food labels show us and can use this knowledge to make informed decisions on what I can eat."


